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Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services for Children and Their Families Program

- Referred to as the Children's Mental Health Initiative (CMHI)
- ► Funded by the Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS) of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)
- ► Largest children's mental health services initiative to date (more than \$1.06 billion)
- ▶ 144 grants and cooperative agreements funded since 1992
- ▶ Each system of care community funded for 6 years
- ▶ 30 communities funded in FY 2005 and FY 2006 (Phase V)



Research Questions

- What beliefs and knowledge about evidence-based practices (EBP) are held by community system of care leadership teams (project directors, evaluators, family representatives, and clinical directors)?
- What evidence-based treatment (EBT) approaches do communities plan to use? Which ones do they implement?
- How important is it to caregivers that they be informed about the research support for, and their provider's clinical experience with, the treatments they and their children receive?

Research Questions (cont.)

- Do the caregivers who were and were not informed about expected improvements, research support for, and provider experiences with, the treatments their families receive differ in their satisfaction with services and outcomes?
- Do groups of youths whose caregivers received or did not receive this information differ in their satisfaction with services and outcomes?



Methods

Data presented here were collected from system of care communities funded in 2005 and 2006 as part of three national evaluation studies:

- ▶The Community Plans Substudy (CPS) of the EBP Study Involved conference calls with the project director, lead evaluator, clinical director, and a family representative of participating communities during their first 2 years of funding
- ▶The System of Care Assessment

Assesses the extent to which grant communities implement the core system of care principles
Collects data from communities about specific EBTs and service


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
▶The Longitudinal Child and Family Outcome Study (Outcome Study)


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
CPS: Positive Perceptions


- The majority of the participants made positive statements about the use of EBTs within their systems of care.
- Leaders see EBTs as a way to improve services, strengthen their system's continuity of care, and maximize the impact of their limited resources.
- Communities that have successfully implemented one EBT are more likely, and perhaps better able, to adopt others.














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
